About the authors

1. Kemal H. Karpat, the editor is Distinguished Professor of History, and Chairman, Middle East Studies Program University of Wisconsin, Madison, USA. He is the author of a dozen books, including Ottoman Population 1830-1914, and more than one hundred articles published in some sixteen countries. A well-known authority on the Balkans he has visited Bulgaria many times.

2. Ilhan Şahin, Feridun M. Emecen, and Yusuf Halacoğlu are associate professors at Marmara and Istanbul Universities. All are affiliated as research consultants with the Prime Minister's Archives in Istanbul and have published numerous studies based on the defters (registers of population surveys).
